Cafferata Family Receives the First Family of Oregon Forestry Award from Oregon Society of American Foresters

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PORTLAND— The Cafferata family was honored with a First Family of Oregon Forestry Award at the 2022 Oregon Society of American Foresters (OSAF) Annual Meeting that was held virtually on April 28, 2022. This is the first time this award has been presented and was created to honor individuals who have shown a lifetime commitment to forestry in Oregon.

The Cafferata family includes Steve and his wife Wylda, daughter Francesca (Fran), sons Sam and his wife Jenny, Mike and his wife Julie, and Joe and his wife Ali, and grandchildren Allison, Anthony, and Alex. All are active in the forestry community. Steve and Wylda are the current cochairs of the Oregon Tree Farm System and are also active with the Oregon Small Woodlands Association. Together, they manage not only the family tree farm but also do the forest management on the Lane County Boy Scout property. Wylda spoke at a Hagenstein Lecture hosted by the World Forestry Center, and is a regular contributor to the OSAF quarterly publication Wooden Tales, as well as to Oregon Small Woodlands Association publications, and currently serves as secretary on the Lane County Small Woodlands Association Board. Steve currently serves as the treasurer for OSAF and represents small woodland owners on the Emergency Fire Cost Committee.

Certified wildlife biologist Fran owns Cafferata Consulting, a consulting firm that provides practical solutions for wildlife and other natural resource management. She has served as a past OSAF chair. Mike is the district forester for the Oregon Department of Forestry's Forest Grove District. All four children and grandchildren work on the Cafferata Family Forest to model sustainable forest practices.
